


Susan Wood's experience over the past 40 years includes serving as a classroom instructor overseeing classroom teachers, coordinating community college preschool practicum students, and providing developmentally appropriate activities for children. After 20 years in the classroom Susan chose to work in an administrative level as a director of two university childcare centers; as adjunct faculty teaching early childhood classes such as Curriculum Planning, Child Human Growth and Development; Child Psychology; as partner and trainer for the Center for Child and family Services Head Start; as a trainer for Los Angeles County Office of Education; as UCLA Extension instructor. Susan's passion to support early childhood educators in providing research based, high quality child education has led to the creation of community outreach programs which has included: workshops, a director support group, research projects, and study groups. She founded and hosts the Annual Early Childhood Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (ECSTEM) Conference. She is an active member of National Association for the Education of Young Children and National Science Teachers Association and has presented workshops on a national level in the areas of early childhood curriculum with an emphasis on science education. 




Jayanti ROV

Shelley Gonzales





BASED ON CALIFORNIA PRESCHOOL FOUNDATIONS, THEY WILL ALSO LEARN SOCIAL STUDIES, (DIVERSITY, GEOGRAPHY AND ECOLOGY). TEACHERS WILL LEARN TO INVOLVE CHILDREN IN STEAM.
